"Go and do the same yourself" Where would we be without the Gospel according to Saint Luke? This Gospel contains many unique accounts of Jesus' teaching that we do not hear anywhere else. More importantly, some of these parables that we hear in Luke's Gospel are so well planted in our imaginations. Think of the

Annunciation, the shepherds coming to the manger and the Prodigal Son – all accounts we will only read in Luke's Gospel. Today's Gospel, of *The Good Samaritan* is again one of those accounts which only appears in the Gospel of Saint Luke.

Indeed, it is one of those accounts that we have heard so often since childhood: we know the problem, we know the solution but often fail to put the instruction into practice. In fact, while we call it *The Good Samaritan*, there is no evidence to suggest that the Samaritan in the story was "good" at all. What Luke does frequently is to question the normal boundaries which, for those who observed it, was probably at the time doing just enough to stay on the right side of the expectations of the Law. The *Samaritan* was *good* in that he went above and beyond what anyone or any Law would have expected of him - and here the normal expectations and boundaries are questioned – and exceeded!

Many recent Popes used the parable as an opportunity to give thanks to those who work in so many capacities in medicine and healthcare – those who will never deny help to their brother or sister in need. Not long after his election as Pope, Leo XIV in a General Audience on 28 May 2025 further reflected upon this parable. He stated that when we want to help someone in any need, we cannot think of keeping our distance from them. The demand, the Holy Father continues, is to "get involved, get dirty, perhaps be contaminated...taking on the burden because one who truly helps if one is willing to feel the weight of the other's pain."

Maybe this is an opportunity not to leave the *Good Samaritan* as a pleasant story from childhood or mere words on the page, but putting into practice of acknowledging, appreciating and going beyond the boundaries of expectations and truly realising the need of my neighbour.

The Good Samarítan

It's not often, thank God, that we encounter anyone lying on the road after being beaten, but we regularly pass people who look careworn and weary, people for whom the sun is just not shining.

The expression on their face might seem to be saying: 'Keep away from me.' But their hearts may be saying something quite different: 'Please interrupt me; ask me how I am; take the chance.' Long faces can mask aching hearts. They might be inviting us, and giving us the opportunity, to be a good Samaritan, to tend to someone in need.

What Jesus does in the parable of the Good Shepherd is take the question 'Who is my neighbour?' and turn it into the question: 'Which of these people acted like a neighbour?' Even if we're not always very good at acting like neighbours, we know what it looks like; we recognise good Samaritans when we see them. And Jesus tells us that our neighbour is identified not by boundaries, or garden fences, or personalities we find it easy to relate to. Jesus insists that my neighbour is whoever is in need.
